FUN FACTS

- **A Presidential Retreat:** Every U.S. president from Herbert Hoover through George W. Bush has stayed at the Arizona Biltmore. There's a history hallway picturing every one of them.
- **Hollywood Honeymooners:** A number of famous couples have spent their honeymoon at the Arizona Biltmore including Ronald and Nancy Reagan, and Clark Gable and Carole Lombard. A frantic Gable lost his wedding ring on the golf course – only to have it returned by an eagle-eyed employee.
- **Marilyn Swam Here:** Marilyn Monroe had her favorite swimming pool at the resort – the Catalina Pool – where she could often be seen lounging by the water. It was named for the colorful tiles used in its construction, which were from Catalina Island off the coast of Los Angeles (the island, like the Biltmore, was owned by chewing-gum magnate William Wrigley, Jr.).
- **A White Phoenix Christmas:** Song-writing maestro Irving Berlin soaked up enough inspiration, in the warm Arizona sun, to pen his famed “White Christmas” while staying at the resort in 1939. He told the *Arizona Republic* at the time: “When I’m working, the sunshine is vital to me.”
- **Impromptu Concert:** In 1988, there was an impromptu, late-night concert at the piano bar by famous guests staying at the resort – Frank Sinatra, Sammy Davis Jr. and Liza Minelli.
- **Birthplace of the Tequila Sunrise:** Circa 1940, a guest asked bartender Gene Sulit to create a refreshing beverage for him to enjoy poolside. He wanted Sulit to use his favorite spirit, tequila, and to surprise him. And surprise him Sulit did with what would come to be known as the “Tequila Sunrise,” the iconic cocktail made famous in songs, movies and American pop culture.
- **Beating the Odds During Prohibition:** The McArthur brothers, the original owners and builders of the resort, found an inventive way to keep their guests happy, and the resort from being closed, during Prohibition: a liquor cabinet that conveniently converted to a bookcase in case of a raid. In the Men’s Smoker, known as the “mystery room” during Prohibition, guests could purchase a “set up” which included a glass, ice and mixers for bootleg liquor. Some of the influential guests during these times were heavy gamblers and bookies who would commandeer the phone lines at certain times of the day. Although betting was illegal, card games were popular and prevalent. Employees who stayed after work to serve players often were treated to winnings.
- **Only Taj Mahal Has a Larger Golden Ceiling:** The lobby of the Arizona Biltmore boasts the world’s second largest gold-leaf ceiling, after the Taj Mahal in India.

At the same time, it has long been a destination of choice for discriminating travelers, whether couples seeking a pampered getaway in an historic setting or families looking for amenities and services for all ages. After 80 years, the Biltmore remains Arizona’s historic *Grande Dame* – the state’s best known retreat for a complete luxury resort experience and a storied landmark recognized around the world.

ARCHITECTURAL LANDMARK: The Arizona Biltmore stands out in Arizona, and worldwide, for its signature design and ambiance. Renowned Frank Lloyd Wright was the consulting architect; he collaborated with a former student, Albert Chase McArthur, who was the elder brother of the resort’s original owners. It was Wright’s first hotel project and remains the only existing hotel in the world with a Wright design.

CELEBRITY PLAYGROUND: The Arizona Biltmore has wined and dined generations of celebrities. Some of America’s most beloved stars made the resort their playground, and stories and anecdotes have flowed from those times, imbuing the resort with a legendary status. Countless other notables have also enjoyed the famed ambiance and guest luxuries over more than seven decades. The Biltmore’s extensive list of famous guests includes: such Hollywood bigwigs as Gracie Allen and George Burns, Fred Astaire, Jack Benny, Marlon Brando, Nicholas Cage, Johnny Carson, George Clooney, Bill Cosby, Tom Cruise, Michael Douglas, Whoopi Goldberg, Bob Hope, Jay Leno, Gregory Peck, Arnold Schwarzenegger, Frank Sinatra, Steven Spielberg, Sylvester Stallone, Sharon Stone and Elizabeth Taylor; musical artists from Glen Campbell to Neil Diamond, Diana Ross, Steely Dan, Elton John, Bruce Springsteen, Eric Clapton and U2; broadcasters such as Tom Brokaw, Barbara Walters, Larry King and Peter Jennings; politicians such as Newt Gingrich, Dan Quayle and Al Gore as well as every U.S. president since Hoover; and sports stars from Magic Johnson to Joe Montana to Michael Jordan.

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Art & Architecture

FRANK LLOYD WRIGHT DESIGN: The Arizona Biltmore is a living architectural masterpiece, showcasing the seminal influence of America’s most heralded architect, Frank Lloyd Wright. As the consulting architect (he collaborated with a former student, Albert Chase McArthur, who was the elder brother of the resort’s original owners), Wright’s dramatic style and imprimatur are imbedded throughout the resort’s design. He advocated “organic architecture” – meaning all parts should relate to the whole, a concept he applied by adopting indigenous materials and influences to make his structures become part of the landscape rather than dominate it. The Biltmore was erected entirely of “Biltmore Block,” a variation on a textile block first used by Wright to construct private homes. The pre-cast blocks were made from desert sand on-site and created in 34 different geometric patterns inspired by the trunk of a palm tree. A reminder that Arizona was known as the Copper State, the hotel was adorned with a glittering copper roof. The lobby was graced with a gold-leaf ceiling that was, and remains, the second largest in the world (after the Taj Mahal). Rather than just an opulent creation, the Arizona Biltmore has, and still retains, the mien of a temple where great art took shape.

BILTMORE SPRITES: They’ve been called the “lost children of Frank Lloyd Wright.” But in 1985 they found a new home in the Biltmore’s gardens, bringing an aura of peace and tranquility to the historic resort. The ‘Biltmore Sprites’ are slender statues of ethereal spirits conceived in 1914 by sculptor Alfonzo Iannelli for Wright for a project he was working on at the time in Chicago. Six of the disarming creations, whose geometric character blends into and complements the resort’s unique Biltmore Block construction, are strategically placed throughout the gardens. They stand watch each day, ensuring the resort’s serenity.

MAYNARD DIXON MURAL: One of the most celebrated Western artists, Maynard Dixon, created a masterpiece at the resort three-quarters of a century ago that remains one of his last remaining murals in existence. “The Legend of Earth and Sun” is among his most evocative and largest works, measuring 8' x 25'. Commissioned to do the piece for the resort prior to its opening in 1929, Dixon sketched the initial drawing on a train from Los Angeles to Phoenix. Drawing inspiration from the Native American tribes he lived with, the mural’s main figures represent the Hopi people’s Father Sun and Mother Earth. Today, resort guests continue to enjoy and experience this spectacular mural which has hung for 78 straight years in the historic Gold Room.

WRIGHT STAINED-GLASS WINDOW: It welcomes arriving guests in all its radiating warmth and stunning brilliance. The stained-glass window created by Frank Lloyd Wright is an explosion of dazzling color and composition, defining him as an accomplished artist as well as a heralded architect. “Saguaro Forms and Cactus Flowers” is more than a penetrating work of art that greets guests as they enter the main entrance: The piece appears to be constructed of organic forms pieced together, mimicking the Biltmore Block construction of the resort itself. And the organic forms are derived from the local desert landscape, informing the fundamental Wright principal of organic architecture (where all parts relate to the whole, indigenous materials and influences are adopted, and the building becomes one with the landscape). Wright’s stained-glass window is a part of the Arizona Biltmore that relates to the whole – reflecting and embodying an architectural legacy that has made the resort an Arizona landmark.

Wright's also features an intimate and atmospheric wine cellar for private dining events for up to eight guests. The extensive wine list features 470 unique labels and about 3,700 bottles, a wide selection of which is stored in the wine cellar. 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Wright's at The Biltmore Serves Indigenous 'American Lodge Cuisine' in Restored Frank Lloyd Wright Art-Deco Ambiance

The historic signature restaurant at the legendary Arizona Biltmore underwent a metamorphosis recently, emerging with an exciting new look and the innovative new culinary concept of *American Lodge Cuisine*. The transformation of Four Diamond Wright's at The Biltmore tied together form, function and flavor – the historic ambiance, the décor and the cuisine – to create a complete dining experience where all the elements blend together to satisfy mind, spirit and palette alike.

The Cuisine: The concept behind *American Lodge Cuisine* focuses on the indigenous cornucopia: tap the rich, diverse and increasingly innovative bounty of American food products, from goat cheese in Maui to organic greens in Arizona, and use those specialty ingredients to prepare an innovative menu of bold flavors, rich texture profiles and elegant but simple presentations. The menu at Wright's is rich and hearty yet down-to-earth, prepared from mostly organic ingredients. Sourcing appropriate ingredients, from American boutique farms, dairies and game providers, was a major focus. Food products from an array of farms were researched, tested and retested to determine the best suppliers, with a majority located in Arizona including olive oil from Queen Creek Olive Mill, snails from Creek Escargot, vine-ripened tomatoes from Eurofresh Farms, and delicate petit lettuces, micro greens and heirloom tomatoes from Sunnizona Farms. Because *American Lodge Cuisine* also emphasizes the freshest seasonal ingredients, the menu is changed regularly to take advantage of the best available foods at a given time.

The Ambiance and Decor: The distinctive, organic art-deco style of Frank Lloyd Wright was brought into the present through restoration and innovative enhancements. The famous Biltmore Blocks, the dazzling gold-leaf ceiling and the wall of windows (the room originally was a solarium) were restored to their original glory. A striking contemporary décor emerged from geometric patterns, a rich palette of jewel-tone colors, and tables and chairs with retro and organic design influences. Tabletops carry on the art-deco theme with geometrically shaped plates, stylishly modern salt and pepper mills, a graceful flower vase, and deep-stepped wine glasses. The look is crisp and clean, simple and elegant, with pewter and wood elements sitting atop butter-colored linens. Outside the wall of windows, a vibrant herb garden and splashing fountain bring the indoors inside – embodying a fundamental principal of Wright's organic architecture. The smartly uniformed wait staff recalls the resort's glamorous Hollywood heyday with their retro-inspired attire.

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Wine Cellar: With a wine collection that is among the finest in the Southwest and consistently recognized by *Wine Spectator* magazine, Wright's makes pairing dishes with appropriate wines an essential part of the dining experience.

The Wright Bar: The previous lounge also went through a transformation becoming sleek and stylish The Wright Bar, featuring a spectacular black-granite-and-wood bar with flowing seating areas and innovative specialty drink menus. The bar spills out into Squaw Peak Lawn to an expansive patio with fire pits and comfortable oversized chairs complemented by spectacular flowering gardens and majestic views of Squaw Peak. Wright's at The Biltmore and The Wright Bar are a dynamic new restaurant and lounge duo at the resort creating an exciting environment for dining, socializing and relaxing.

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A Historical Look at an Architectural Landmark

The Early Years

It's no wonder that the Arizona Biltmore has been an Arizona landmark since its opening on February 23, 1929, when it was crowned the "Jewel of the Desert." It was the state's first resort, and would spark the development of the now all-important tourism industry. It was built in grand style and scope – and constructed to last for a long, long time – with the influence of America's premier architect of the era. And through the years, as it expanded, improved and renovated, it has remained true to this storied legacy that made the hotel a favorite playground of the powerful and famous.

Frank Lloyd Wright was the consulting architect for the Arizona Biltmore; he collaborated with a former student, Albert Chase McArthur, who was the elder brother of the resort's original owners, Charles and Warren McArthur (wealthy Chicagoans drawn to the desert who also owned the local Dodge franchise). It was Wright's first hotel project and remains the only existing hotel in the world with a Frank Lloyd Wright design. Wright also worked on The Imperial in Tokyo, but it was destroyed in 1968 to make way for a new high-rise.

The spirit of the dramatic Wright style, that favored indigenous materials and influences, is imbedded throughout the design of the hotel. The Arizona Biltmore was erected entirely of "Biltmore Block," a variation on a textile block first used by Wright to construct private homes. The pre-cast blocks made from desert sand on-site -- and created in 34 different geometric patterns inspired by the trunk of a palm tree -- were designed by Emry Kopta, a prominent southwestern sculptor. Blocks of glass, built into the walls, brought natural lighting. A reminder that Arizona was known as the Copper State, the hotel was adorned with a glittering copper roof. The lobby boasted a gold-leaf ceiling that was, and remains, the second largest in the world (after the Taj Mahal). Rather than just an opulent creation, the Arizona Biltmore has, and still retains, something of the mien of a temple where great art took shape.

The construction was exceptional, but costly. With the original construction estimate of \$1 million doubling, the McArthur brothers soon lost the hotel to one of the original investors in the project who had deeper pockets. In 1930, Chicago chewing-gum magnate William Wrigley, Jr. became the sole owner. Over the course of the next 43 years, the Wrigley family owned and operated the Arizona Biltmore and, under their aegis, it became world renowned as a preferred luxury oasis for celebrities, heads of state, captains of industry and other famous travelers.

A grand era of extravagance and cachet swept through the hotel during the Wrigley years. The Arizona Biltmore weathered the Depression and WWII without a blip on the radar screen. A stock market board in the hotel was complemented by a billiard room, soda fountain, barbershop, branches of exclusive Phoenix shops, skeet shooting, and a stable for riding desert trails. A covey of quail was tended so guests could be assured fresh quail eggs. Prohibition was circumvented by the "mystery room," a men's only smoking room up a back stairway, as well as discreet service for guests on the terrace.

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A Celebrity Playground for Seven Decades

The Arizona Biltmore has wined and dined generations of celebrities. Some of America's most beloved stars made the hotel their playground, and stories and anecdotes have flowed from those times (see the "Anecdotes, Tidbits & Gossip..." piece in the Press Kit). Countless others have enjoyed the hotel's famed ambiance and guest luxuries over more than seven decades.

The list is too extensive to provide in full, but to name a few: Hollywood celebrities such as Gracie Allen and George Burns, Fred Astaire, Jack Benny, Pat Boone, Marlon Brando, Bill Cosby, Nicholas Cage, Johnny Carson, George Clooney, Tom Cruise, Michael Douglas, Whoopi Goldberg, Bob Hope, Jay Leno, Gregory Peck, Arnold Schwarzenegger, Frank Sinatra, Steven Spielberg, Sylvester Stallone, Sharon Stone and Elizabeth Taylor. Musical artists such as Glen Campbell, Neil Diamond, Diana Ross, Elton John, Bruce Springsteen, Eric Clapton and U2. Broadcasters such as Tom Brokaw, Barbara Walters, Larry King and Peter Jennings. Politicians such as every U.S. president since Hoover, Newt Gingrich, Dan Quayle and Al Gore. Sports stars such as the L.A. Lakers, San Antonio Spurs, Chicago Bulls, Magic Johnson, Joe Montana and Michael Jordan. And other notables such as Julia Child, Gloria Vanderbilt and Kate Spade.

Additional Historical Notes: 1973 to the Present

- * 1973: The Wrigley family sells the Arizona Biltmore to Talley Industries
- * 1973: Six-alarm fire causes considerable damage; Taliesin Associated Architects (of Taliesin, the original estate and Frank Lloyd Wright School in Wisconsin) commissioned to reconstruct damaged floors and renovate the resort-at-large.
- * 1975: First expansion since 1929 with opening of the 90-room Paradise Wing.
- * 1979: The 120-room Valley Wing and a 39,000-square-foot Conference Center are added.
- * 1982: The 109-room Terrace Court wing opens.
- * 1987: Extensive renovation completed including remodeling 120 guest rooms in main building in addition to the East Wing and the Garden Wing.
- * 1988: Historic cottages are refurbished.
- * 1996: Four-year comprehensive renovation and expansion is completed; the three-phase, \$50-million project, handled by Barry Design Associates of Los Angeles, included refurbishing guest rooms and suites, and adding The Villas luxury residential complex, restaurants, state-of-the-art kitchen, Paradise Pool complex featuring a 92-foot-long water slide and 23 cabanas, 15,000-square-foot Pavilion meeting facility, and an 18-hole championship putting course.
- * 1998: The 22,000-square-foot Arizona Biltmore Spa, fitness center and full-service beauty salon opens.
- * 1999: New Arizona Wing featuring 120 guestrooms, Olympic-sized swimming pool and two meeting rooms; addition increases guest room to current total of 738.
- * 2002: Major enhancement and expansion of meeting space, to tune of \$25 million, is launched; 15,000-square-foot McArthur Ballroom opens October 2002.
- * 2003: The new 25,000-square-foot Frank Lloyd Wright Ballroom is unveiled in July, bringing the total indoor meeting space to 100,000 square feet.
- * 2004: The Arizona Biltmore celebrates 75 years in the Valley of the Sun.
- * 2009: Ocatilla at The Biltmore opens as the resort celebrates its 80th anniversary.
